WHAT'S ON

INGS VILLAGE SCHOOL / HALL - A HISTORY

The children of Ings were taught in the chapel from about 1633. Rowland Wilson may have been taught there. He, like Robert Bateman, was a local boy who made his fortune elsewhere and later became a local benefactor. Wilson became a wealthy London vintner. In his will in 1651, he left all his lands in Grassgarth to his grandson, and at the same time charged him with the support of the School in or near the Chapel of Ings to teach the children in the hamlet of Hugill. For many years £12 per annum was paid for this purpose, and according to a report of the Charity Commissioners in 1835 the same sum was still being paid to the Schoolmaster and Incumbent of the Parish, Revd. J. Airey, for which he taught the children of the hamlet, and any others that came to him, free of charge. According to this same 1835 report attendance at the School averaged 35 in the winter half-year, and 12 in the Summer! The children were taught classics, reading, writing and accounts. Other endowments for the school were received from Robert Bateman (1743) and John Braithwaite (1854).

Throughout the C19th the chief occupations were agriculture and bobbin turning. The population of Hugill township in 1871 was 421 having risen from 237 in 1801. In 1870, school attendance was 45 in Winter, 12-15 in Summer. June: "A very thin school, in consequence of so many children having to do sheep-washing." August: "Only 24 present, harvest has begun." A Schools Inquiry Commission in 1869 reported "The school room is cramped and low, but there seems to be some chance of a new school being built, for which a site is offered close to the present room. All that is required is money for the building, and this might be provided in the discretion of the Trustees from Mr Braithwaite's benefaction." The school was rebuilt the same year. Until 1845, from its inception, the Schoolmasters were Incumbents of the Parish. From 1905 onwards Head-teachers were appointed by Westmorland County Council. After over 300 years educating local children, Ings School was closed at the end of the Summer Term 1972, when there were only 16 names on the register.

Under the 1944 Education Act, many school buildings and associated properties were made the responsibility of Church of England Diocesan Education Boards, who became answerable to the Charity Commissioners for seeing that these assets were used for the continuance of Christian education within the Diocese. When rural schools were closed, in order to protect the interests of local communities where the loss of a school building would have been a serious blow to community life, the Diocesan Board of Finance gave assistance to Parochial Church Councils and local Trusts to retain their buildings. Consequently, the Hall was offered to the PCC of St Anne's Church for £3500. A total of £6000 was duly raised, to cover the purchase and the cost of renovation. The school was officially re-opened as a Parish Hall on Saturday October 6th 1979.

Parking charges for Staveley Mill Yard have not yet been applied. When they do come into effect, this may have a significant impact within the village.

Traffic speeding in Ings: A resident of Ings reported that once again there was an increase in traffic speeding away from the 40mph restriction when travelling towards Windermere, and requested that the Speed Indicator Device (SID) be deployed again. It was noted too that the increase in traffic volume and speed on Moorhowe Road remained an issue. News of action by Westmorland & Furness Council of the request to reduce the speed limit in various parts of Ings is awaited.

Staveley Post Office: Concerns were expressed about the imminent closure of the current Sub Post Office in Staveley and the need for a new location and Sub Postmaster. Contact to be made with the Post Office to find out what process they have in place when a closure occurs and whether the PC can be of assistance.

Ings Playground: Further measures to deter the moles in the playground at Ings have now been taken. We await the outcome of this action. PC is grateful to the working party from Ings that cleared debris, tidied shrubbery, raked old molehills and re-seeded in early March. A permanent 'dogs on leads' sign to be erected.
